

Under the Trees Market


Set in the Southern Suburbs of Cape Town, Constantia, this is a "Must Visit" Market.




Start your day off with a delicious breakfast at The Local in Huddle Park. They open at 7.30 am on weekends. The venue is spacious, making it the perfect place for any function.


EXPLORING GIBA GORGE WITH AUSTRALIAN SHEPHERDS

iscovering a dogfriendly hiking spot in KwaZulu-Natal can be challenging, but our excitement peaked when we learned about Giba Gorge Adventure Park through Facebook. Eager to head out on an adventure with our two Australian Shepherds, we set out at 5 am for the two-hour journey to the park. Upon reaching the boom gate, an entry fee of R40 per person granted us access to the Adventure Park, where we geared up for our hike.




Our destination was Macintosh Falls, known as the largest and most beautiful waterfall hike, offering a 10km trail that proved challenging for both humans and dogs. Adequate preparation is key for this route, but we later discovered an easier alternative. Despite the initial confusion regarding trail starting points, the friendly bar staff provided helpful directions and we headed off on our adventure.

The routes were very well-marked, which made it impossible to get lost. Synthetic grass-covered bins dotted the path, leading us through scenic single-track and dense bushy areas. We had no idea of the unexpected obstacles that awaited us. At one point we reached a wooden ladder, luckily I had a hiking companion who helped me with the dogs. Larger and nervous dogs will have difficulty getting to the top of the rocks. The next challenge was a rope-assisted rock climb, which added an element of difficulty. We pulled ourselves up, while the dogs found this challenge much easier and climbed up on their own. A narrow ascent over rocks took us alongside waterfalls and rivers, with wooden bridges with gaps presenting additional challenges, requiring the dogs to be carried.

Water sources along the route allowed our dogs to hydrate and cool off, although caution was necessary around stagnant water. After a 5 km climb, we reached the spectacular Macintosh Falls, a rewarding spot for a swim and a picnic. The dogs and humans enjoyed a refreshing swim. The scenery was magical and a great cool-down treat for all. Despite a conveniently placed trash bag, some visitors unfortunately left litter on the ground.

We expected to return along the same route but were surprised with a downhill path lacking the earlier obstacles.







While it offered a respite from climbing, the absence of single tracks and exposure to the heat, we had to make more stops to give the dogs water. This route is ideal for people who still want a good hike, but do not want the obstacles of the harder route.

Arriving starved at the park's restaurant, we were met with friendly and helpful wait staff. Suggestions for tasty pizza flavours were appreciated, and a bowl of water for the dogs was promptly refilled. The staff even replenished my water bottle upon request. With other dogs present, everyone adhered to the rule of keeping dogs on leashes and picking up after them, maintaining a clean and enjoyable environment. With plenty of bins nearby, you won't be stuck with stinky bags for long.

Reflecting on our experience, Giba Gorge Adventure Park proved to be a welcoming destination for all ages. The restaurant offered delicious food, and the staff demonstrated genuine friendliness. Besides the challenging Macintosh Falls hike, the park provides shorter, easier trails to smaller waterfalls, accommodating a variety of preferences. Additionally, mountain biking enthusiasts can explore numerous trails.

The park's true pet-friendliness was evident in their consideration of dogs. While the Macintosh Falls hike may not suit every dog or person, the availability of an obstacle-free alternative route ensures an enjoyable experience for everyone.

The Puppy School Essentials! >>>>

TURN YOUR PUP INTO A PRO

It is fundamental to expose puppies to a range of positive experiences during the first few weeks of their lives, as this directly and significantly influences their brain development. Puppies that encounter numerous positive experiences develop a higher number of cognitive connections in their brain, and these connections provide lifelong benefits like enabling them to easily solve problems. The critical window period for a puppy to socialize and establish as many connections as possible closes around 16 weeks of age.

Embracing a world of opportunities

The world presents a magnitude of opportunities, therefore your puppy can and should be exposed to various stimuli from an early age. Failure to do so may lead to your puppy experiencing regular fear responses when encountering unfamiliar situations later, this can be detrimental to their overall well-being. Elevated cortisol (stress hormone) levels can lead to increased breathing, heart rate, muscle tension, and elevated blood glucose levels. These physiological responses may have damaging effects on the digestive, reproductive, or immune systems. Over time, this pattern of chronic stress can contribute to the development of anxiety and depression in your puppy. Dogs are social animals and experiencing the world around them releases happy hormones which makes your puppy feel good and boosts their confidence

Meeting your puppy's needs

A virtuous puppy school ideally includes all 7 forms of enrichment in the curriculum.

Social enrichment - in the form of safe supervised play so that puppies develop bite inhibition, learn competitive skills, and dog body language (calming signals).

Visual enrichment - with mirrors or other interesting objects.

Auditory enrichment - sounds from the environment with controlled volume levels.

Tactile enrichment – provide different walking surfaces for example.

Olfactory enrichment – different smells like interesting safe plants.

Cognitive enrichment - new objects, problem-solving.

Food-based enrichment - sausage bobbing, food puzzles snuffle mats, etc.





Different training methods

Puppies are inherently driven by their survival instincts, making food a potent primary motivator for luring, shaping, and capturing desired behaviours during training.

Repetition is key in a dog's learning process, and continuous reinforcement is highly effective for teaching new skills. "Jackpotting" is a method of delivering a few treats one after the other immediately after your puppy has had a breakthrough with a challenging task. This brings home the message that they did something right!

Timing is crucial and rewards need to follow desired behaviors as quickly as possible to ensure that puppies understand what they are being rewarded for.

Reputable puppy schools also include information about how to fade lures, the difference between low and high-value treats – and when to use which.

Life skills

Puppies need to learn how to settle in a busy environment and how to calmly greet other pups. Face-to-face introductions are never a good idea, and we need to guide puppies on how to greet one another.

Basic obedience

Puppy class sets the scene for basic obedience and ensures that you and your puppy have a meaningful relationship. If you have a great relationship with your puppy, future training will be fun and your puppy will be eager and willing to learn.

Zani Koen mentioned, "Attending puppy classes has been a crucial step in creating the "adventure" dog of my dreams. The socialization with other dogs, people (even children), and different environments from a young age has helped to turn Soda into a confident and optimistic adult dog".

Puppy classes will ensure your puppy will be ready and emotionally equipped to easily progress into dog sports and other disciplines with a solid foundation.

Cooperative care

According to a study by the "From Forceful to fear free" publication, 51% of people said their pets dislike going to the vet. If your puppy is desensitized to being touched and experienced body handling from an early age, they will learn that they have a choice in the matter, and cooperation becomes voluntary. Forcefully handling a puppy creates fear and distrust in people.

Training Tips

#1

Always have **two different types of treats** for class, one lower value for the beginning of class when they are very eager to eat the treats and a high-value treat for when they are less attentive and more satiated.

#2

Choose a **reward marker** word to be used for praise and consistently use that word when your pup performs the desired behaviour. A treat immediately follows the reward marker word.

#3

Rewards can be anything your pup enjoys; it does not always have to be food. You may *use the environment to your advantage*, for example, sniffing rewards.

Always end training on a high note.

This will ensure that your puppy is excited and ready for the next round of training with you.

It is our hope that our dogs remain fit and healthy, but accidents do happen and teaching them a few life skills can reduce a lot of stress for them and for you.

Archie, our energetic, slightly chaotic, Mallinois cross dachshund had an accident in the garden recently. Partaking in one of his speedy jaunts, he ran too close to the wall and tore the skin off his leg. Once the 15cm size wound was repaired, the monthlong recovery required a drastic change in his daily routine.

Here are some life skills Archie was taught as a pup that reduced the stress during the post-op healing stage.

WEARING A CONE

Archie's wound was on his thigh and easy for him to lick or chew at the stitches. A dog's mouth is full of bacteria and allowing them to lick the wound can cause infection and wound breakdown. Some dogs can become very stressed when wearing a cone and can refuse to eat, drink, walk, or lay down with it on.
Unfortunately, Archie had to wear a cone, but thankfully he had seen one before and even tried one on for a fun training session, so wearing it wasn't a huge adjustment.

Dog cones are relatively inexpensive and it is a good idea to keep one at home just in case. Taking it out occasionally and feeding your dog treats around it can build up positive associations. You can even encourage your dog to push their head into the cone and reward whilst it lays loosely around their neck.

MUZZLE TRAINING

Muzzle training is a life skill all dogs could benefit from. Whilst your dog may be friendly, pain and fear during a traumatic event can cause a dog to react uncharacteristically. Whilst the vet will try and reduce pain with medication or sedation, it may still be present. For safety, the vet team may have to put one on.

ENSURE MUZZLE AND CONE TRAINING SESSIONS ARE SHORT AND FUN.

BODY HANDLING

Post-operative care may involve the owner changing bandages and cleaning or treating wounds. If your dog already dislikes being handled, their behaviour will only get worse when there is pain and discomfort involved.

Your dog must be comfortable with you feeling over their body, examining ears, eyes, and mouth.

If your dog needs repeat visits to the vet for procedures, ask them about medications to reduce stress that you can give at home before leaving for the appointment.

A CHANGE TO EXERCISE ROUTINES

Whilst it is good to have a regular walking routine with your dogs, we want the dog to be able to cope if that routine changes. Now and then, replace the daily walk with a calm activity or enrichment at home.

CONFINEMENT

Some post-op recovery requires a dog to be confined and restricted from any exercise other than toilet breaks. For the first couple of days, the dogs are often tired and painful, and keeping them rested is relatively easy. Once they are feeling better in themselves it is much harder to keep them calm. In some situations, a crate or confinement to a smaller area may be necessary. Crate or confinement training is ideal, before the time when it is necessary.

SEPARATION IN A MULTI-DOG HOUSEHOLD

To train the dogs to be comfortable with being separated, start with short play sessions on a one-to-one basis. The dogs should look forward to being with you and having individual attention. Build on the duration of separation over time. You can even separate them so they have their own space to eat a chew and let them back together when they have finished. Your dogs should begin to look forward to solo time, because good things always happen when they are separated.

All of these behaviours are easy to implement and are well worth it if it reduces problems during an already stressful time.



When our dogs are no longer able to have physical exercise, we will need to increase their mental stimulation to ensure they cope with their new restrictive lifestyle. In the next issue, we will share tips and tricks for mentally stimulating a confined or recovering dog.

Holiday-Specific Pet Hazards



Toxic Foods

Chocolate, raisins, grapes, and some sugar substitutes like xylitol can be deadly to dogs and cats. Ensure that holiday treats are kept out of your pet's reach and educate your guests about the dangers of feeding pets from the dinner table. Vomiting and diarrhea are very common so ask your vet about the best medication to add to your first aid kit that can help with dehydration and set their tummy.



Decorations

Holiday decorations can pose various risks to pets. Cats may be attracted to tinsel, which can cause intestinal blockages if ingested. Tree ornaments, especially those made of glass, can break and cause injuries. Candles can lead to burns or fires. To keep your pet safe, secure decorations, and consider using alternatives like pet-friendly ornaments.

A Guide to Canine Blood Donation

As pet owners, we always want the best for our furry companions, and sometimes that means helping other animals in need. One way to make a significant difference in the lives of our canine friends is by considering blood donation for dogs. In this article, we'll explore how canine blood donation works, the requirements for becoming a blood donor, and its impact on the pet that gives the gift of life.

Just like humans, dogs sometimes require blood transfusions to treat various medical conditions, such as trauma, surgery, or certain diseases.

Blood donation in dogs can be a lifesaving procedure, but it relies on the generosity of healthy, willing donors.



How it works

Selection of Donors

To be eligible as a blood donor, dogs must meet specific criteria. They should weigh more than 25 kilograms, be between 1 and 7 years old, fully vaccinated and dewormed, and exhibit good health and a calm temperament. Additionally, dogs that have never received a blood transfusion before are preferred donors.

Blood Collection

Blood donation typically involves taking about 450ml of blood (1 unit), which is approximately 10% of a dog's total blood volume. The procedure is quick and safe, often lasting 10-30 minutes, depending on the dog's size and the collection method used. Blood donors are sometimes placed under light sedation which is immediately reversed after the donation process.

Monitoring & Recovery

After donating blood, dogs are closely monitored to ensure they recover well. They may receive treats, pets, and plenty of love for their heroic act.

Future Donations

Healthy dogs can donate blood approximately every 8-12 weeks, making it a sustainable way to contribute to the well-being of other dogs.

Impact on the Donating Pet

Canine blood donation has minimal to no adverse effects on the donor dog when performed by experienced veterinarians. The amount of blood taken is carefully calculated to ensure the dog's safety and well-being. Dogs may experience a temporary drop in blood pressure during the donation process, but this is generally well-tolerated.

The donor dog's body naturally replenishes the lost blood over a short period. A few days of rest and some extra treats are usually all that's needed to ensure a full recovery. Many dogs continue to live healthy, active lives, making them eligible for future donations.

Can Any
Breed Donate
Blood?

Most dog breeds can become blood donors, provided they meet the specified criteria. The primary focus is on the dog's size, age, health, and temperament rather than their breed. However, certain breeds are more commonly seen as blood donors due to their size, such as Greyhounds, Great Danes, German Shepherds and Pitt Bulls, which tend to have compatible blood types for transfusions.

Ensuring the Best for Your Furry Companion in Divorce or Separation

It's a tough reality to face, but many of us have experienced the end of a romantic relationship. What can make this situation even more unpleasant is having to go to court to dispute pet custody. Fortunately, in today's world, the concept of "pet-nups" or pet nuptial agreements has emerged as a practical solution to a prevalent issue in contemporary relationships. As pet ownership surged during the pandemic, it has become crucial to address the question of how to handle the fate of our cherished four-legged family members in cases of divorce or separation.

A Pet-Nup, short for pet nuptial agreement, functions much like a prenuptial agreement but pertains to the living arrangements of pets in the unfortunate event of a relationship breakdown. Currently, when a dispute arises regarding pets during a divorce, the only recourse is often costly litigation in court. The outcome can be uncertain and emotionally taxing. Pet-nups, however, offer a proactive approach to determining your pets' living arrangements in advance. They serve as a means of safeguarding the welfare of your pets and ensuring the best outcome for all parties involved.

Pet Custody Mediator Karis Nafte is a certified dog behavior consultant, founder of whokeepsthedog.com. She has extensive experience dating back to 1996 helping families and their pets across the globe. She is about to publish a book on her unique role where she facilitates constructive conversations between disputing parties with regards to the pets instead of resorting to expensive legal battles.

She came across this career after she noticed a pattern in dogs she evaluated, "I've come across many dogs who were having anxiety issues, behaviour issues, who were experiencing stress in various ways. And the cause of those behaviour problems was a bad divorce decision or an unfair custody decision in terms of the dog. I work with people that love their animals enough to want to do what's right for them, regardless of the outcome."

A Pet-Nups Purpose

Firstly, they provide a detailed plan for your pet's future in the event of a divorce. Beyond this, they act as a legal safeguard for your pet. While our pets are cherished members of our families, the legal system doesn't recognize them as such. In the eyes of the law, they are classified as property. Courts may not prioritize their welfare as they would for human children. Thus, pet-nups offer a way to ensure an amicable settlement regarding pet care is established before any potential disputes arise.

Will my Pet-Nup stand up in Court?

Although Nafte has never come across a petnup being used in court specifically in South Africa, she says they are a 'wise-decision', but not legally binding in terms of our law.

Nafte says, "The animals are viewed as personal property in court. They're not seen as children. So the person needs to prove ownership. The challenge with all legal things is that nothing is black and white. Some people will say, well, I paid for the dog. But then the other person might say, my name is on the vet records and the registration papers of the dog. So, therefore, the dog is mine, so even proving ownership is not as easy as people think."

Although pet-nuptial agreements are not legally binding documents in the strictest sense, they carry weight in court. A well-structured pet-nup that comprehensively outlines pet living and care arrangements will be considered when the court makes a decision. Without a pet-nup, the court may treat the pet as any other marital possession. In situations where couples are not legally married, cohabitation agreements may be used to address pet care.

What is in a Pet-Nup?

Nafte says going to a lawyer who will likely charge an hourly rate will set you back anywhere from R1,000 to R10,000. But there are online drafts for free that can be tailored to the unique needs of individuals and their pets. When drafting a pet-nup, consider including the following:

- Clarification of pet custody and ownership, as well as visitation rights
- Care arrangements should someone fall ill or pass away
- Decision-making authority for medical care
- Insurance responsibilities
- Ongoing veterinary expenses
- Maintenance, such as grooming or boarding
- Food provisions
- Other day-to-day care and breeding expenses
- Custody arrangements

Incorporating these elements ensures that the document is as close to a legally-binding agreement as possible, minimizing ambiguity and potential disputes.

Nafte highlights that in some instances, separations and divorces can turn acrimonious, leading to situations where individuals may contemplate euthanizing their pet or relinquishing them to a shelter out of a desire to prevent the other party from claiming a perceived victory.

"If animals end up in a shelter, then technically the animal becomes the property of that shelter. And then anyone who might potentially, you know, wanna get the animal, then has to go through the adoption process, which can be complicated and and and is really something you wanna avoid," she says.



Pet Ownership, what does that mean in South Africa?

Legally, pets are considered assets, akin to personal property like cars or toasters. Typically, the individual who purchased the pet is recognized as its owner. In divorce, this legal ownership often supersedes the emotional bond. Exceptions may apply if there is clear evidence that the pet was a gift to the other party.

When children are involved, the court may consider the pet's living arrangements alongside the child's best interests. Children's emotional ties to pets hold significance, and the court will prioritize their welfare.

Nafte says that although South Africa doesn't recognize animals legally as sentient beings, it will be interesting in the future to see what happens with legislation as young adults are

opting to have pets rather than children.

She says, "Millennials and the Gen Zs who are getting married, are having pets rather than having babies. In America specifically sometimes up to 1/4 of the divorces that they work with involve a pet custody issue. So it is becoming a global concern for people because when people don't have Children, but they do have pets, the pets have the same emotional weight that a child does.

Nafte emphasizes the importance of prioritizing caution over regret, as ownership disputes can still arise. She explains that if, for instance, a husband originally gifted his wife a dog, reimbursing him for the dog's cost could potentially be interpreted as a transfer of ownership, further complicating the situation.

In more challenging scenarios, if the divorcing couple cannot reach an agreement on pet ownership, the court might consider selling the pet and dividing the proceeds. This is an extreme measure, usually used as a last resort.

In light of these possibilities, having a Pet-nup in place is highly recommended to protect your furry companions and make their future more certain and secure.

Genetic Testing for Working Breeds



What are working dogs?

Workings dogs are breeds that were originally bred to assist humans with a variety of tasks such as hunting, pulling sleds and herding cattle or sheep.

There are many different categories of working dogs including service dogs, therapy dogs, sniffer or detection dogs, police, military, search and rescue, herding, livestock, and guard dogs. The most commonly known being the service dog (guide dogs, mobility assistance and seizure dogs). Each of these categories perform vital roles that benefit society.

Why genetically test working dogs?

Breeding and selecting suitable candidates to be working dogs entails a long list of requirements from behavioural traits to physical ability. Genetic testing should be one such requirement. Genetic testing can provide vital information about a dog's health or their future health. Many of the working breed categories are filled with specific breeds due to the breed traits that make them ideal for the role. For example, police dogs are usually German

Shepherds, while guide dogs are usually Labrador Retrievers. Each breed, especially pure-bred dogs, is at risk of inheriting certain diseases. Many of these inherited diseases are late-onset and will only show symptoms later in life.

Should a guide dog be placed with an individual or placed in a specific role, one of the requirements is that the dog be as healthy as possible. Late-onset genetic diseases will show no symptoms until an animal has already been placed with an individual or in a specific role. However, if genetic testing is done before placement, preventative measures can be taken (if possible) to mitigate or prepare for the development of the disease. For example, Copper Storage Disease is a common inherited disease for Golden Retrievers. but environmental factors and diet can contribute to the development of the disease. Therefore, if tested before placement, the dog can still be placed but with a diet that will help prevent symptom development.

Genetic testing should always be done for working dogs to give organisations or individuals vital information about the health of the dog. This allows for no surprises later on in the dog's life.



Many diseases outwardly unrelated are actually caused by an unhealthy gut microbiome. Likewise, studies done in dogs and cats suggest that many health issues often observed in today's pets, such as oral disease, gastrointestinal diseases, skin and urinary tract problems, and bacterial infections, are all closely linked to changes in the gut microbiome.

As seen in humans, the majority of health issues are caused by environmental causes, with the most prevalent being an inappropriate diet.





ANIMAL SANCTUARIES

HOW TO IDENTIFY A LEGITIMATE ANIMAL SANCTUARY

For those who have a deep concern for animals and wish to support rescue efforts, animal sanctuaries can be a compassionate alternative to exploitative captive facilities. The term "sanctuary" traditionally signifies a haven or a protective refuge.

egrettably, there are instances where certain entities, particularly those self-identifying as sanctuaries, misuse this label for purposes contrary to its true meaning: some unethical roadside zoos and breeding facilities have started labeling themselves as "sanctuaries" or "rescues" to attract customers, even claiming to contribute to species conservation.

To avoid falling victim to these deceptive tactics, you can follow a few straightforward pointers to determine whether a facility genuinely supports animals or is exploiting them. You can often find answers to these questions by examining the facility's website and social media profiles before planning a visit.

In South Africa, big cats and elephants are the most commonly exploited animals in facilities claiming to be "sanctuaries."

FREEDOM TO MOVE AND ENCLOSURE HABITAT

Depending on the species-specific needs, animals should have sufficient horizontal and vertical space for exploration, roaming, climbing, and foraging.

Legitimate sanctuaries do not take their animals on the road for public display but provide them with a comfortable and stimulating environment with minimal human interference.

Reputable sanctuaries strive to replicate the natural habitats of their animals. Social animals should have suitable partners for companionship and emotional stimulation. Be wary of cramped enclosures with concrete floors or enclosures with worn pacing paths.

ENRICHMENT!

Habitats should provide opportunities for both physical and psychological

stimulation, like climbing structures for chimpanzees, bathing areas for tigers, and spacious fields for grazing animals. The purpose of enrichment is to facilitate natural behaviors rather than merely creating a picturesque scene for visitors.

CUB PETTING OR TOUCHING OF ANY KIND?

Reputable sanctuaries housing wild or exotic animals (such as big cats, elephants, primates, and wolves) do not permit any hands-on interactions, including posing for photos. Such interactions disrupt and distress animals and pose risks to both animals and visitors.

Animals should not be treated as props. Read it again.
Reputable sanctuaries should be treated like retirement villages for animals.

DOES THE FACILITY BREED?

Legitimate sanctuaries refrain from breeding. They understand that breeding contributes to the problem they aim to solve. It takes up valuable sanctuary space that could be used for rescued animals and depletes limited resources needed to rescue others in need. You also have to ask what they are breeding for and where are those animals ending up.

WHERE DID THE ANIMALS COME FROM?

Many animals are discarded by private owners or come from circuses, roadside zoos, laboratories, or other exploitative industries. True sanctuaries offer animals a permanent home until the end of their lives, except in rare circumstances where it benefits the animal. They do not engage in animal trading, borrowing, or lending. Staff at genuine sanctuaries are often eager to share individual stories, shedding light on the harmful industries affecting these animals.

WHO SUPPORTS THEM?

One of the well-respected accrediting bodies for animal sanctuaries is the Global Federation of Animal Sanctuaries (GFAS). GFAS may conduct an on-site visit to assess a sanctuary's compliance with their standards - which are rigorous. Most accredited sanctuaries do not breed or sell animals and provide rescued exotic animals with peaceful, spacious, and natural habitats among their own species. In terms of South Africa, unfortunately, there are no accrediting bodies.

Remember to trust your instincts. If you suspect that a facility may mistreat animals for profit, ask more questions. Is the animal's housing subpar? Are they stuck in small concrete or dirt-floored cages and no meaningful enrichment?

If you are already on-site, express your concerns, request a refund, and leave. Report them to your nearest SPCA. A genuine sanctuary prioritizes the needs and desires of its residents over the interests of paying gawking visitors, ensuring a lifetime of excellent care.

Supporting unscrupulous sanctuaries with ticket sales, funds neglect and cruelty, and no visit is worth the lifelong suffering endured by animals stripped of their dignity and natural behaviors.

THE FIVE FREEDOMS

Certainly, the 5 Freedoms are essential principles that guide the humane treatment of animals in various environments, including sanctuaries:

Freedom from Hunger and Thirst: Animals in sanctuaries should always have access to clean, fresh water and a nutritionally appropriate diet that meets their dietary needs, ensuring they are healthy and energized.

Freedom from Discomfort: Animals should be provided with comfortable living conditions that protect them from adverse weather conditions (such as excessive heat, cold, or rain). They should also have access to clean and appropriate shelter.

Freedom from Pain, Injury, or Disease: Sanctuaries have a duty to ensure the physical well-being of animals under their care. This includes providing prompt and proper veterinary care to prevent and treat illness or injury, as well as implementing measures to minimize risks.

Freedom to Express Normal Behavior: Animals should have the space, resources, and opportunities to engage in natural behaviors specific to their species. This may include foraging, socializing, grooming, exploring, or playing.

Freedom from Fear and Distress: Animals should not be subjected to unnecessary stress or fear. Sanctuaries should create an environment that minimizes anxiety-inducing factors and promotes the psychological well-being of animals. This includes avoiding loud noises, aggressive handling, or other distressing stimuli.

By adhering to these 5 Freedoms, sanctuaries ensure that the animals in their care enjoy a high quality of life, free from unnecessary suffering and in line with principles of animal welfare and ethical treatment.

The Story of Mushu, the Pittie-Mix

There is nothing that warms our hearts more than seeing a TEARS rescue pet experience its well-deserved SECOND CHANCE and be adopted into a loving family that knowingly takes on the challenge of a dog that was once broken in body, heart, and spirit and demonstrates what it means to be loved unconditionally.

When Pittbull-X Mushu came to **TEARS** as a 4-month old puppy, he had experienced a lifetime of pain and torturous treatment by his litter mates. His body was covered in horrific wounds from repeated attacks from his siblings, which were left untreated by his owners, before he was surrendered to **TEARS**. His journey from rescue, treatment, rehabilitation and rehoming took four months, until he was adopted by his pet

parent, Saya.

Saya shares this story:

"Given the number of people who sadly return adopted animals due to their own incapacities, the team at **TEARS** went to great lengths to ensure that we knew what we were in for by adopting a power-breed that had experienced significant trauma from an early age. Just like adopting any other child, we were committed for the duration of his journey to trusting humans again. No amount of "bad" behaviour would change the fact that we were now his legal parents/custodians, or that we were fully committed to loving him through it all.

Despite the risks, Mushu turned out to be the kindest, gentlest, and most loving animal. While he continues to exhibit his trauma triggers which include loud noises, the hose, broom, or the shoe of a man coming too close to him, it's still an amazing feat that he's not more emotionally scarred considering what he survived.

The first time we saw him wag his tail was his first day at the dog park. He ran full speed towards the other dogs, screeching to a halt a meter before reaching them. The first time we heard his voice was during one of his little dreams. When he's not giving the ridgebacks a run for their money, his best friends are the puppies and senior dogs, where he exhibits a gentleness that's unmatched.

We struggled to go into certain community spaces initially, as many would see a white "pitty" with his big pirate scars and either leave or ask us to go elsewhere. So we decided to dress him up before any outing. Painted gold nails, bowties, flower crowns, and decorative festive hair dye were among his classic outfits.

Today, Mushu is somewhat famous and always brings a smile to everyone he meets. Due to popular demand, he even has his own Tiktok account! 


